#### From the Pastor's Desk:

So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. – John 13-13-15

The act of foot washing was something a lowly slave would perform for someone greater. Jesus knelt down at his disciples' feet and set an example for them, and for us: That even the least of our actions can care for and serve another. The Church grew out of the work of the followers of Jesus who sought to care for one another. Even to the extent they sold what they could and made resources available to all in their community.

Being the worshiping Church requires a lot of actions – from turning out the lights after worship to helping clean the buildings and grounds. Going out in the world as the church gives us a lot of opportunities as well.

When I first started serving here in North Stonington I did a poll of the congregation to discover how church members volunteered and for how long. It was encouraging to learn that our little faith community gave over 11,000 hours during the year and reached out with time and donations to over 200 organizations! 

This year's emphasis is Planet vs. Plastics

For Earth Day 2024 on April 22nd,

EARTHDAY.ORG is unwavering in our commitment to end plastics for the sake of human and planetary health, demanding a 60% reduction in the production of ALL plastics by 2040. There have been problems over the last decade getting the corporations to comply; for quite a while they were not wholly dedicated because of assuming the environmentalists were over-reaching. Now, they finally see the cause as important and real. Now it is make-up time. It is called **advanced recycling** – you can see this in the new COKE bottles that are totally made from recycled plastic. Recycled plastic can also be used with food grade packaging for better containers with less plastic.

Six Basic Steps need to be set in place and be followed on a global scale. This needs the planning and cooperation of municipalities and every level of processing.

- 1. Collection requirements
- 2. Sorting
- 3. Shredding and Processing
- 4. Re-Building new wrappings and containers
- 5. New types of Plastics
- 6. Circular plastics or "Continual recycling.
