From the Pastor's Desk:

"We love because God first loved us."

The season of Advent invites us to slow down and remember that every good gift comes from above. As we prepare for Christmas, we have the opportunity to cultivate a deeper awareness of God's generous presence in our lives. This becomes the wellspring from which our own generosity flows.

One of the ways I enjoy preparing room for God in my life is our Monday morning Bible Study. This Advent we are discussing Lee Stroebel's *The Case for Christmas*. We begin by exploring the truth of the gospels in the story of the Nativity.

Advent Devotionals are also available outside the office for anyone who is interested in deepening their daily conversation with God. The theme this year is Practicing Generosity. We often think of generosity as something being asked of us...but have you thought about the fact that we *receive* generosity from God? One writer said: "If we . . . refuse to let God be generous to us, we will find ourselves trying to give from empty wells. The most generous people are often those who have learned to welcome God's gifts with open hearts and grateful spirits."

This Advent be open to receive God's gifts: the gift of rest, of beauty in creation, in acts of kindness from others, and the hope that come with the promise of Christ's birth.
